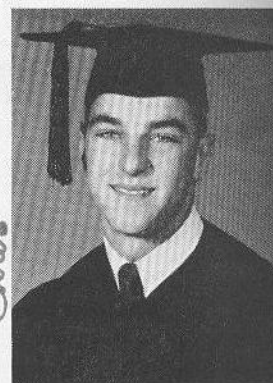
Stafford Heads Senior Class For Third Consecutive Year

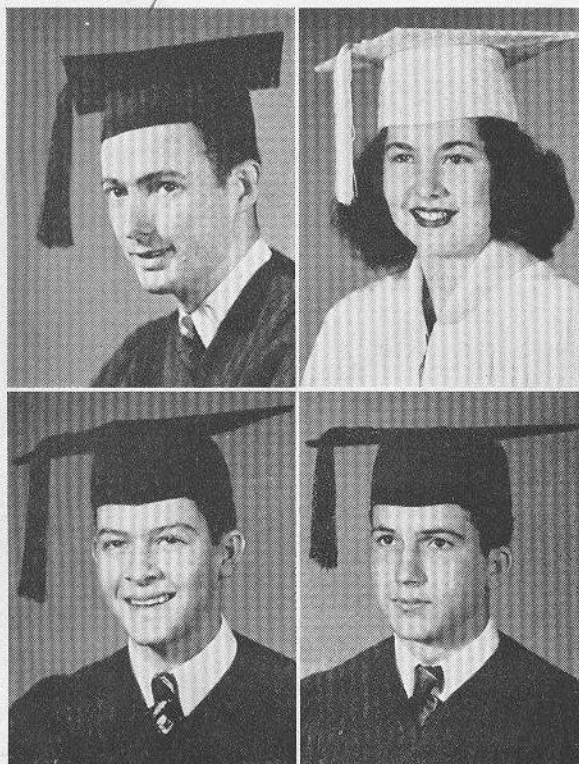
